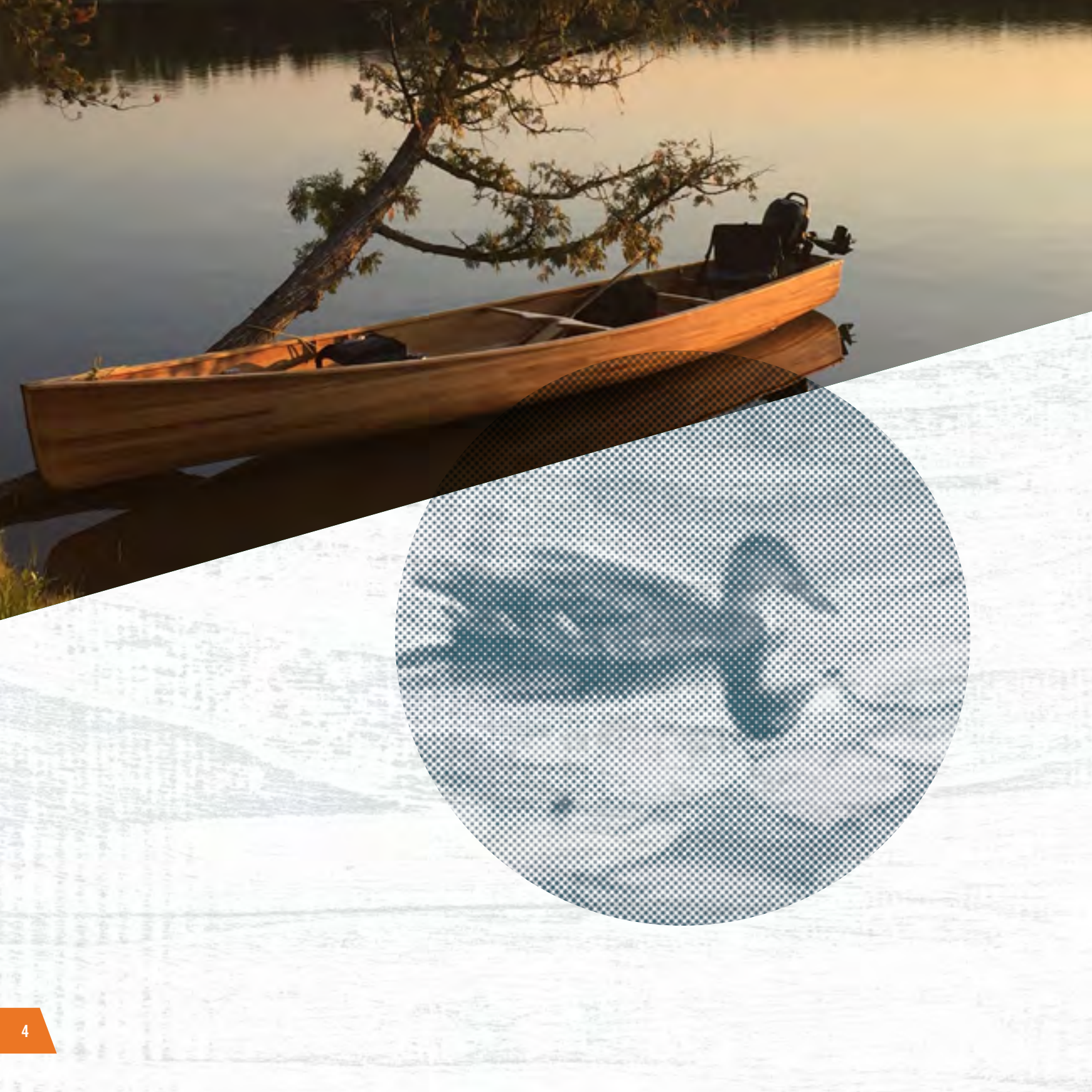

ABOUT GREENSTONE

Greenstone was formed on January 1, 2001 by the amalgamation of the former towns of Geraldton and Longlac, the townships of Nakina and Beardmore, and a vast area of unincorporated territory including numerous settlements such as Caramat, Jellicoe, MacDiarmid and Orient Bay.

The Municipality of Greenstone is located approximately three hours northeast of Thunder Bay. The 2016 Census indicated our population is at 4,636 residents.

Within Greenstone's expansive borders, residents are located in one of six wards; Beardmore, Geraldton, Longlac, Nakina, Rural East or Rural West. Each ward has different characteristics related to size, composition, layout and infrastructure which makes each ward unique and distinct in its own right.

Greenstone neighbours several Indigenous communities: Long Lake 58, Lake Nipigon Ojibway (Animbiigoo Zaagi'igan), Biinjitiwaabik Zaaging Anishinaabek / Rocky Bay Reserve, Bingwi Neyaashi Anishinaabek / Sand Point, Aroland and Ginoogaming First Nation.

4.0 GREENSTONE – NATURE’S HOME TOWN

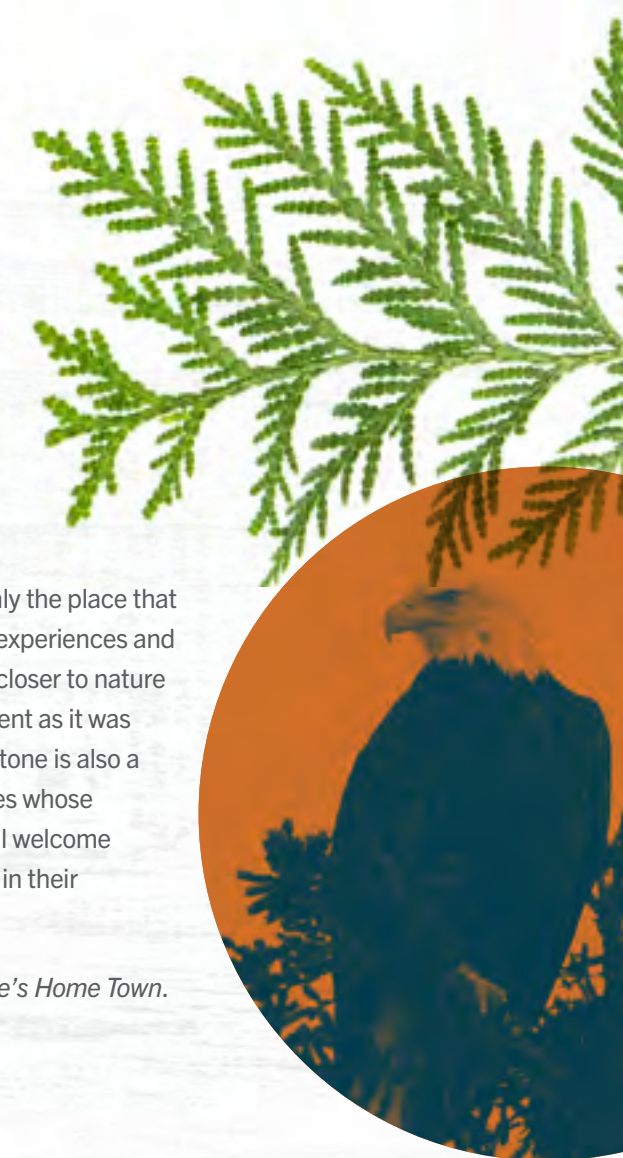

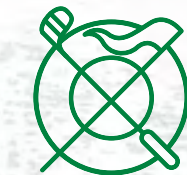

FISHING AND HUNTING

The fishing in Greenstone is some of the best in North America. Avid veterans will get maximum trophy catch, and novices can learn and expand their fishing skills and understanding. Surroundings are so peaceful and calm and facilities so good that the allure is for all—not just the traditional guys.

Greenstone and the surrounding area has 44 outfitters that offer fishing and hunting opportunities. Most of them are equipped with boat and motor rentals as well as guided services if you desire.

- Outfitters in Greenstone – 44 resort/outfitter operators, 18 fly-in, 24 drive-in and 2 charter boats on Lake Nipigon
- Notable lakes and rivers – Lake Nipigon, Long Lake, Onaman Lake, Kenogamisis Lake, Ogoki and Albany River which flows from James Bay
- Species of fish – Walleye, Northern Pike, Lake Trout, Brook Trout, Rainbow Trout, Splake, Perch, White Fish, Smallmouth Bass, Sturgeon, etc.
- Animals – Black Bear, Moose, Grouse, Wolf & Waterfowl

CANOEING/PADDLING

Here are five canoe routes in Greenstone offering a range of difficulty and length.

LONGLAC / STEEL RIVER CANOE ROUTE

7-14 days (varying starting points)

Longlac / Steel River canoe route is part of the Heritage Trail Series in Canada. It is the historic route between Long Lake and Santoy Lake via McKay Lake and Steel Lake.

This route requires that a canoeist have at least intermediate skills due to the demanding nature of some of the portages and white-water encounters along the trip. As you travel this historic voyageur route, you will be using traditional First Nations and voyageur portage trails connecting the labyrinth of rivers and lakes that make up this exhilarating adventure. You will encounter spectacular landscapes carved by glaciers, fish for the ever-present walleye, view moose feeding on shoreline vegetation as you quietly paddle by, and sleep each night under a sky bursting with stars. This trip of a lifetime is only one of many unique wilderness adventures offered in the Greenstone region.

MARSHALL LAKE CANOE LOOP

7-10 days

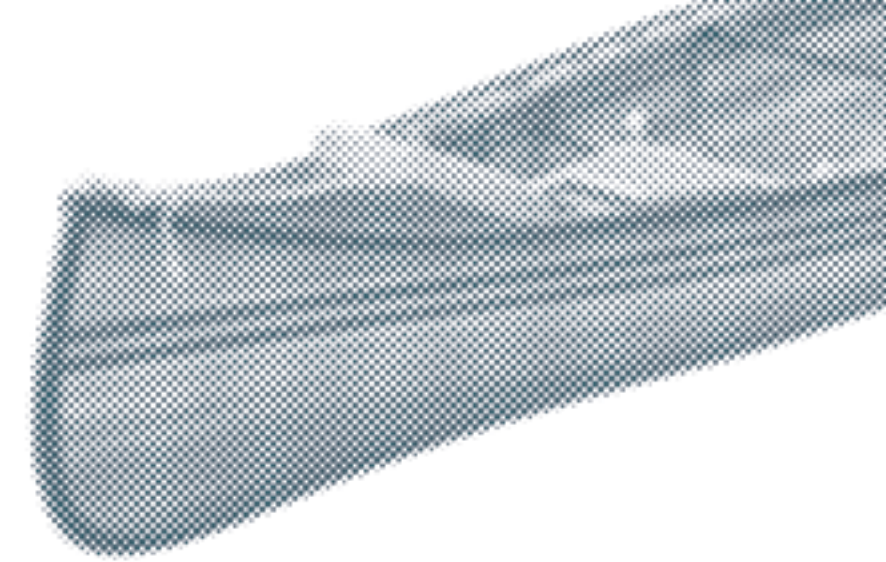
Canoeists interested in a wilderness adventure which incorporates history, wildlife viewing and exceptional fishing will find this trip particularly appealing. Your adventure takes place on land and water traditionally used by the Ojibway for hunting, fishing, and trapping over thousands of years. Steeped in history, the route offers the keen observer an opportunity to locate pictographs on the steep rocky shores of the deep blue lakes and wide flat rivers. The Woodland Caribou, a threatened species, can also be seen drinking at shore's edge by the lucky canoeist. The majority of the route travels along lakes and rivers with minimal whitewater; however, a couple of difficult portages require that the canoeist have at least intermediate ability.

GERALDTON TO LONGLAC

Two to four days

30 to 50 km, depending on start points. 50 km version would start at Geraldton waterfront and end at Longlac waterfront. If all portages are used, the level of difficulty is low for most canoeists.



THE GOLDFIELD TO GERALDTON

Two to three days

35 km. Could be shorter if trip was ended at First bridge on highway or at MacLeod Park. There is good whitewater on this trip for experienced whitewater paddlers. However, there are ports around all whitewater as well.

THE BLACKWATER RIVER, JELICOE TO BEARDMORE

Two to three days

40 km, fairly easy, around four ports, some around log jams, waterfalls, etc.

HIKING

We actively promote 3 hiking trails in Greenstone.

LAKE NIPIGON SHORELINE TRAIL

With 5 km of trail, the Lake Nipigon Shoreline Trail walks you through the remnants of the 1999 Beardmore forest fire. The trail provides great opportunity to pick wild blueberries as they are present throughout your hike. Take your friends and family and enjoy the stunning views of Lake Nipigon at two lookout stations. The trail travels along the shore of Lake Nipigon and during low water periods you may choose to walk the beach for a section of the trail. The fine sand will tempt you to remove your shoes and walk barefoot on the beach.

Poplar Lodge Park – This fully serviced municipal campground is located on the beautiful shores of Lake Nipigon. The park offers excellent swimming, a long sandy beach, a children’s playground and access to 5 km of hiking trails.

Just east of Beardmore on Highway 11, turn onto Highway 580 and drive for approximately 20 km. Just before Poplar Lodge Park, turn left onto the gravel road marked “High Hill Harbour” and travel for 3 km. Keep watch on your right-hand side for a large trailhead sign with a small parking area.

RIVERVIEW HIKING TRAIL

This hike is 2 km one way. Evidence of the past logging operations can be seen along the Kenogami River in the form of large groups of logs driven into the riverbed and then bound together. At the end of the trail there’s a two-tier viewing platform which provides a place to sit and rest while overlooking the Kenogami River.

Boreal Lowlands – Elevated boardwalks allow users to walk through the wet forest without disturbing the ecosystem. This forest is home to unique plant and wildlife species that are described on the interpretive signs along the trail.

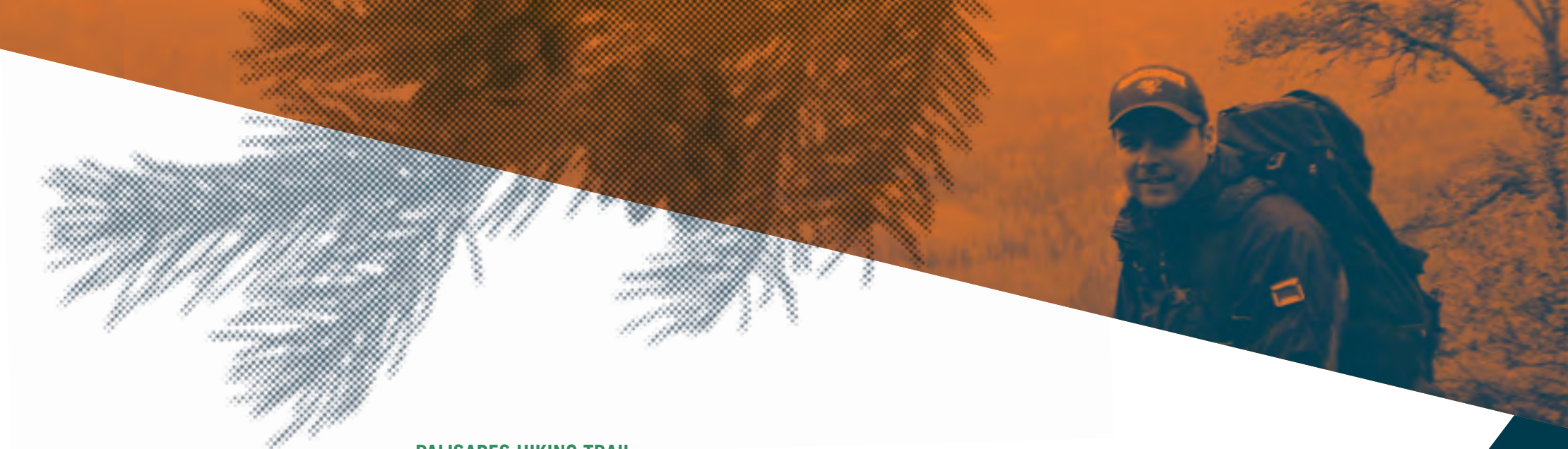
In the community of Longlac, turn onto Forestry Road (located on the left travelling from the west and on the right travelling from the east). Make a left turn onto Riverview Street and proceed to the end of the street. Make your way to the northeast end of Riverview Campground where the trail entrance is located.

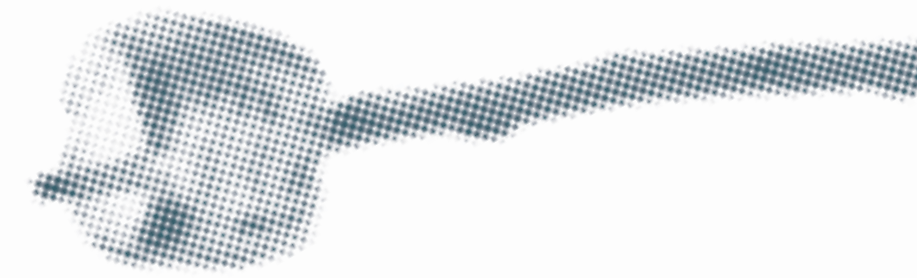
PALISADES HIKING TRAIL

Formed 1.2 billion years ago through water and ice erosion and columnar jointing, the Palisades of the Pijitawabik (pronounced pidg-i-ta-wa-bik), located at Orient Bay in the Municipality of Greenstone, are one of the oldest and most remarkable geological formations Northwestern Ontario has to offer!

The hiking trail is a tourism asset because of its picturesque towering cliffs and numerous waterfalls that can always be seen from Highway 11. It’s also intriguing to those travelling when you look up and see people rock climbing. Being 500 feet above Lake Nipigon is an incredible sight to take in. There’s also Brouse Lake atop the Palisades, which is a popular place to relax and have a picnic. The Palisades also serve as a major moose travel corridor, providing ample aquatic feeding grounds for this monarch of the boreal forest.

Distance from Beardmore to the turnoff on Highway 11 for the Palisades - Approximately 20 km northwest of Beardmore on Highway 11, turn left at the blue and white highway sign identifying the trail entrance. The parking area is located 200 m from the highway.





CAMPING

RIVERVIEW CAMPGROUND

Located in the community of Longlac, this convenient campground has 14 sites available, 7 with full hook-up (water, electricity and sewer), and 7 with electricity only. It offers washroom and shower facilities, a boat launch, a kayak dock, a hiking trail, a park for children, and dumping services. The campground opens the long weekend in May and closes the long weekend in September.

POPLAR LODGE PARK

Located on Highway 580 just east of the Community of Beardmore, this municipal park offers visitors 125 campsites, 45 of which offer electrical and water hook-ups, a wealth of recreational opportunities including swimming, hiking, boating and fishing, as well as some of the most stunning scenery the Greenstone region has to offer. Just 5 kilometres from the Park is High Hill Harbour, a docking and service station for commercial and pleasure crafts including fuelling and pump out facilities.

MACLEOD PROVINCIAL PARK

MacLeod Provincial Park is located 3 km east of the junction of Highway 11 and Highway 584 (the turnoff to the community of Geraldton). The Park has 120 campsites, of which 28 have electrical service and a group camping area on the shores of Kenogamisis Lake.

The park has two comfort stations, a boat launch, vault toilets, a park for children, trailer dumping and a fish cleaning station. Please note that campsites are available on a first come, first served basis.

CORDINGLEY LAKE CAMPGROUND

Located 5 km north of Nakina on Cordingley Lake, this lovely campground has 7 sites with electrical service, and approximately 16 other open sites for camper trailers. Some tent sites can be utilized in the wooded areas. A change room/washroom facility is located next to the campground. A 300-foot sandy beach is also adjacent to the campground, with a newly constructed boat launch nearby within a few minutes' walk.

ICE AND ROCK CLIMBING

With 110 waterfalls ranging to over 130 feet high and freezing up to 33 feet thick, the Pijitawabik Palisades boast the greatest concentration of climbable ice east of the Rockies. These 500-foot cliffs draw ice and rock climbers from all over the world to Orient Bay to test this imposing precipice.

Year-round visitors will marvel in the pristine wonder of thunderous waterfalls and fantastic views that this scenic destination has to offer. In warmer weather, hikers and photographers will enjoy a scenic trek up the Palisade Hiking Trail to heights over 500 feet.



CROSS COUNTRY SKIING

Greenstone has 2 cross country ski clubs with groomed trails for both classic and skate skiing with endless kilometres of beautiful scenery. This activity attracts many locals and tourists. Ski rentals and passes can be purchased in both Geraldton and Longlac.

LONGLAC CROSS COUNTRY SKI CLUB

The Longlac Cross Country Ski Club offers over 50 kilometres of groomed trails.

GERALDTON CROSS COUNTRY SKI CLUB

The Geraldton Cross Country Ski Club is located at MacLeod Provincial Park. This Ski Club provides you with 5 kilometres of beautifully groomed trails and scenic views of Kenogamisis Lake.



SNOWSHOEING

In Greenstone, snowshoeing is extremely popular as our winters bring fresh blankets of snow to walk on. Create your own route or choose one of Greenstone's many hiking trails to trek through and enjoy the beautiful winter scenery.

This easy, safe, and inexpensive activity is the perfect way to enjoy the fresh winter air with friends and family. Pick a route, pack a lunch, dress warm, create your own adventure, and experience the great outdoors!



SNOWMOBILING

With endless feet of snow and hundreds of kilometres of pristine wilderness trails, the Greenstone Snowmobiling Clubs bring the combined trails and resources of the Geraldton Snow Club and Longlac Snowmobiling Club together. All located directly off the Trans-Canada highway in Northwestern Ontario.

The Greenstone Snowmobile Clubs are once again part of District 15! There are many great opportunities being part of a District including a NEW trail that goes from the community of Longlac to Hearst. Over 200 km of new trails to ride.



6.0 ATTRACTIONS

THE MACDIARMID TRAIN TUNNEL

This picturesque tunnel now sits as a reminder of days gone by and offers a historic picnic stop for the whole family. It's situated off Highway 11 near MacDiarmid.

NAKINA RAILWAY STATION

Nakina railway station was established in 1914. This station is currently in use by Via Rail. Transcontinental Canadian trains stop here.

THE BEARDMORE SNOWMAN

Situated in Beardmore, the 35-foot structure holds a fishing rod in the summer months and a curling broom in the winter.

BIRCH BARK CANOE MONUMENT

Upon entering the community of Longlac from the west, visitors are met by the monument of a birch bark canoe commissioned to memorialize the history of the Long Lake area including its earliest human inhabitants, the Ojibway peoples, through the height of the fur trade and forestry boom, to its incorporation as a town in 1964.

ACTIVITIES, PROGRAMS AND SERVICES FOR ADULTS, FAMILIES AND KIDS

Greenstone has an abundance of clubs, sports, groups and everyday activities for adults and families. With so many options there is bound to be something that fits your interests. Here is a list of just some of the activities each community in Greenstone has to offer.



RECREATION PROGRAMS

Many recreation programs are available, such as: baseball, indoor and outdoor soccer, hockey, curling, junior golf, swimming lessons, karate, girl guides, scouts, air cadets, gymnastics, basketball, badminton, volleyball, craft night, EarlyON (kids activities ages 0-4), summer day camp.

Recreation Programs are open to anyone within the guidelines of each program, and a minimum and maximum number of participants are set for each class.

We are always looking for individuals willing to share their skills to run classes for the Municipality. Instructors are paid an honorarium for their programs, and the Municipality will help with advertising, collecting registration fees and setting up for the classes. 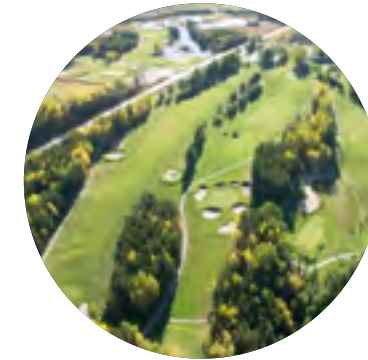

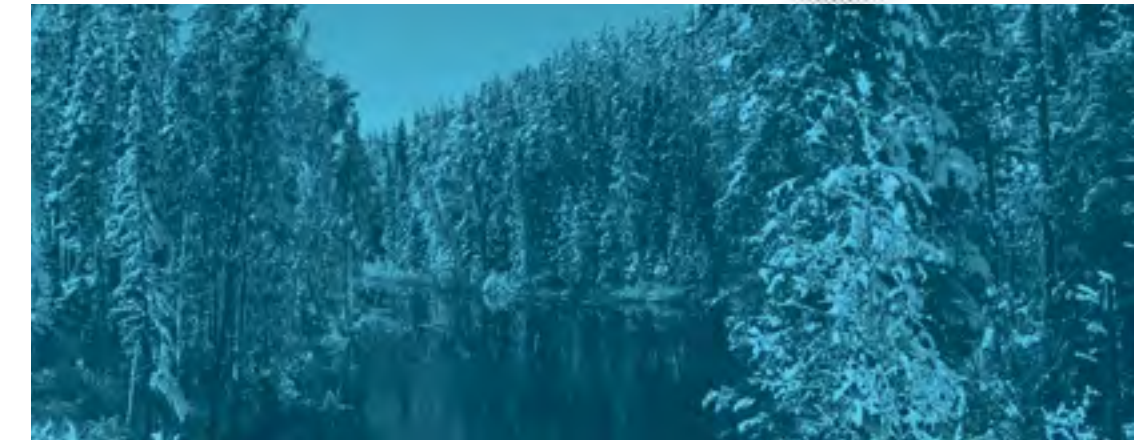
